Significant Accomplishments

A decade of serving abused children

This year, the Mayerson Center for Safe and Healthy Children recognizes its 10th anniversary. In its first decade, this hospital-based child advocacy center has conducted more than 10.000 forensic interviews of children. We continue to participate in the care of physically abused patients, having seen the largest number of infants suffering from inflicted head injury this year. We continue to intervene in cases of medical child abuse to prevent unnecessary medical care. We also represent the hospital in the court process by providing testimony in these cases and have been named in numerous court of appeals decisions.

Training programs for trauma and sexual abuse

Through the Trauma Treatment Training Program, we have trained more than 250 community mental health providers in

evidence-based treatments for childhood trauma. We have developed a training program for pediatric sexual assault nurse examiners. We teach forensic interviewing to Children's Protective Services workers, law enforcement officers and prosecutors throughout Ohio. We provide teleconferencing activities for physicians, nurses and investigators nationwide who work in the area of child abuse and neglect. We also focus on prevention through more than 35 trainings offered to parent groups and others by our Stewards of Children Sexual Abuse Prevention program. We also assist in debriefing communities when they find that their young children are victims of sexual offenders.

National and local leadership

Several of our faculty play significant roles in local, state and national programs that seek to eliminate child abuse. Those efforts include:

Barbara Boat, PhD, served as Chair of the Ohio Domestic Violence Network Steering Committee on Animal Abuse and Domestic Violence.

Kathi Makoroff, MD, presented at the 2010 Pediatric Academic Societies annual meeting in Vancouver and was elected to the Executive Committee of the Ray Helfer Society.

Heidi Malott, LISW-S. was elected President of the Board of Ohio Network of Children's Advocacy Centers. She also serves on the Supreme Court of Ohio Subcommittee on Child Abuse and Neglect and the Hamilton County Commissioner's Task Force on Community Safety from Sexual Offenders.

Erna Olafson, PhD, PsyD, served as Chair of the Justice Consortium of the National Child Traumatic Stress Network.

Erica Pearl, PsyD, was elected President of the Cincinnati Society for Child Clinical Psychologists.

Frank Putnam, MD, director of the Mayerson Center, testified this year before the U.S. House of Representatives on the impact of trauma on children's mental health. He also presented findings of the Institute of Medicine report on parental depression and parenting to the National Press Club.

Robert Shapiro, MD, was an invited speaker at the American Osteopathic Association conference in New Orleans.
