SEMINAR DESCRIPTION

Parents and caregivers are often given very basic and general information about childhood development even though there are many systems that are growing simultaneously in the first six years of a child's life.

During this seminar, trained specialists from Children's Hospital will provide parents, caretakers, and early educators specific information about each developing system. A pediatrician and dietitian will review nutrition and growth. Fine and gross motor skills and sensory integration information will be provided by a physical therapist and an occupational therapist. Speech-language pathologists will discuss speech and language development while an audiologist will review typical hearing function. In addition, a behavioral psychologist will provide an overview of social-emotional development and function.

Common delays or problems associated with these areas will be also be discussed. Resources, strategies, and information on how and when to refer a child for a more specialized evaluation and care will be provided to the audience. Following all presentations, there will be a panel question and answer session to address any questions from the participants.

LEARNER OUTCOMES

- describe the various areas of development including social-emotional, motor, speech-language, hearing, and nutritional information and concerns.
- recognize normal and 'at risk' development or functioning in the areas of social-emotional, motor, sensory integration, hearing, speech-language, and nutrition.
- discuss possible resources and strategies that improve delayed or 'at risk' concerns in the home and classroom.
- identify the accurate process for referral for children with suspected difficulties in these areas.
