Critical Care Building Among Several Construction Projects in Avondale

If you hadn't noticed, Avondale is in the midst of a construction boom with several projects underway including Cincinnati Children's Critical Care Building. The 635,000 square foot building would provide 228 new critical care beds, a roof-top heliport for emergency care and an outdoor community common area. The building will adjoin the hospital at the corner of Burnet and Erkenbrecher. It's set to be completed by early 2021.

Other Avondale Construction Projects

Avondale Town Center in the heart of Avondale will include the construction of two new mixed-use buildings, and the rehab of a portion of the existing Town Center. The project includes 69 residential units and 75,000 square feet of retail space. The residential units target renters with a mix of incomes. A freestanding laundromat will be located at the center of the property.

National Institute for Occupational Safety and Health (NIOSH) is

committed for the NW quadrant of the Uptown Corridor. Construction on the \$110 million federal research facility is set to begin in 2019. bringing 800 jobs to the Uptown Corridor.

Ronald McDonald House broke ground in September on a new \$49 million expansion project that will more than double the space to house families of sick children. The expansion would add 99 guest rooms and 81 parking spaces. The new facility is scheduled to open in 2020.

More Children, More Adults Get Flu Shots Driven by Campaign

Flu seasons are unpredictable and that's one big reason why Cincinnati Children's partnered with the First Ladies for Health and Kroger to offer free flu shots as part of Family Health Day on Sunday, October 14th.

A total of 186 children and 605 adults received flu shots in 13 different locations. The flu shot campaign led by Cincinnati Children's helped build awareness of the benefits of the vaccine. The campaign focused primarily on churches and recreation centers. The effort paid off with a 19% increase in vaccinations over last year. A week before Health Day, many Pastors and First Ladies decided to be role models and get a flu shot themselves. "I hope that by getting a flu shot in front of my congregation that it encouraged others to do the same. It was good to see so many of my members taking charge of their health," said Dr. Robert Baines, Pastor of Southern Baptist Church.

About 150 families made their way to Rockdale Academy, one of two host locations in Avondale. Screenings of all kinds were offered including: blood pressure, asthma, vision, hearing, sickle cell, body mass index (BMI) among others. Corinthian Baptist Church was another host location in Avondale.

In its fourth year, the First Ladies Initiative brings together around 50 health partners for the one-day event held in churches and recreation centers to be most convenient to the community. Co-chairs Dena Cranley and Barbara Lynch say, "The event is all about getting people to take charge of their health and meeting them where they live. That's huge for us."
