Camara Jones, MD, MPH, PhD

Adjunct Professor, Rollins School of Public Health, Emory University

Dr. Jones is a family physician and epidemiologist whose work focuses on the impacts of racism on the health and well-being of the nation. She seeks to broaden the national health debate to include not only universal access to high quality health care, but also attention to the social determinants of health and equity. As a methodologist, she has developed new methods for comparing full distributions of data in order to investigate population-level risk factors and propose population-level interventions. As a social epidemiologist, her work

on race-associated differences in health outcomes goes beyond documenting those differences to vigorously investigating the structural causes of the differences. Dr. Jones hopes her work will eventually lead to a national campaign on equity and racism.

Gail McCray, MA, CHES

Community Health Educator

Ms. McCray is a Community Health Educator focused on community empowerment to reduce unnecessary disease and premature death in socioeconomically disadvantaged communities. Her work is in community-based health promotion in research, demonstration projects and service programs, and in policy development with a primary goal of closing the gap between community and medical research and practice. She includes CBPR/participatory action in her work and is involved in teaching a community health course related to social determinants of health to

medical students. She is also actively engaged on the national and state levels to gain recognition for community health workers/promoters/ navigators as integral members of the U.S. health care system.
